

### 1. SUMMARY

September marked the arrival of spring, bringing warmer conditions that signalled the beginning of our construction season. Despite receiving 160mm of rainfall and experiencing a minor weather event later in the month, we were able to make solid progress across multiple activities.

Our stabilised patching programme kicked off in Russell, moved through Opua, and continued into the Waimate North area. Brian's pavement crew delivered 1,356m² of stabilised patches, setting a strong foundation for the season ahead. The sealing crew are fully prepared for the upcoming season. Our sprayer passed all compliance checks, and the team have been warming up by sealing patches in anticipation of the reseal programme launching in October.

In the western sector, culvert renewal works progressed steadily, with 14 new culverts installed. Ray's crew also completed extensive water tabling and headwall installations. Once these works wrap up, attention will shift to future heavy metal and wearing course sites, ensuring drainage is in place ahead of pavement construction.

The construction team provided support throughout the month, assisting with water tabling on reseal sites and culvert clearing as part of our broader focus on improving drainage across the network. These efforts accompanied other pre seal repair activities, with the shoulder works now nearing completion. The combined contributions from various teams have helped maintain steady progress and prepare the network for the upcoming season.

Our concrete crew has been busy on the Wiroa/Waimate North rehabilitation project, which has involved a large amount of concrete and drainage work. The site is progressing well and remains on track for completion in October. For photos and further details including updates on the Kempthorne Road rehab, please see the rehabilitation section of this report.

The patrol crews carried on with their "find and fix" strategy which has enabled early intervention and reduced the need for larger-scale repairs, keeping our roads safer and more reliable. It appears we will continue to run with this model moving forward, in addition to some fine tuning of inspection frequencies.

As the season shifts, so does the energy across our teams. There's a noticeable lift in momentum and morale as crews return to full swing. The early start to our pre seal repairs has set a positive tone, and with reseals just around the corner, the network is poised for significant improvements. Collaboration between crews has been strong, with shared resources and support helping to overcome wet weather challenges and keep progress on track. It's shaping up to be a productive and rewarding season.

### 2. WORK PROGRAMME

A total of 1,637 individual work items were completed throughout the month of September, of which 1,263 were routine find and fix issues, 316 were programmed works, 10 renewals/capital projects, 7 cyclic and 41 were callouts or emergency response works.

October 2025 forward works programme has been submitted in AWM.

# 3. ROUTINE INSPECTION REPORT

A total of 468 Inspections (patrolled roads) have been completed routinely for September.

# 4. ROUTINE WORKS COMPLETED

Routine maintenance activities completed in September:

- 232 sealed potholes repaired
- 3,816 unsealed potholes repaired
- 2,469m3 of running course applied
- 153.2km of unsealed roads graded equating to 20% of the total unsealed network
- 361 Catchpit entrances cleared
- 0.16km of (hand) roadside vegetation cut back
- 40.8km of tractor vegetation control

# 5. EMERGENCY WORKS

Most of the emergency works carried out in September were in response to earlier weather events. However, some smaller-scale issues did arise following rainfall later in the month. The team addressed these through targeted activities including scour repairs, tree removals, and minor slip clearance. These interventions helped maintain road safety and accessibility across the network.

### 6. DRAINAGE MAINTENANCE & RENEWALS

Drainage maintenance activities completed in September:

- 7.53km of water tabling
- 130.5m of Culvert pipes replaced/new (14 new lines)
- 121 Culvert inlet/outlets cleared
- 26 Culverts flushed
- 30 Headwalls constructed

Ray's crew has successfully completed the replacement of 14 culverts across 12 different roads, significantly improving stormwater management and resilience across the network. Along with the planned works, they also carried out essential maintenance activities, including culvert clearing and water tabling, to ensure optimal drainage and reduce the risk of future disruptions and increase network resiliance.

# 7. FOOTPATH MAINTENANCE/RENEWALS

No footpath renewals were undertaken in September. Instead, Mike's crew focused their efforts on supporting concrete and drainage works along the Wiroa/Waimate North Rehabilitation. They also installed flood markers on the frequently inundated bridge along Pukepoto Road, helping improve safety and visibility during high water events. The team also completed multiple bridge repairs across the network, including sites on Pipiwai, Lovatt, Tipene, and Hupura Roads.

# 8. ROAD FURNITURE ACTIVITY

- 10m of railing renewal/replacement

# 10. UNSEALED NETWORK

Maintanence metal was applied to 45 roads across the network in September. This treatment aims to improve traction and extend the lifespan of the pavement throughout the winter season. Roads included:

# 11. VEGETATION

In September, a total of 40.8 kilometres of roadside vegetation was successfully trimmed as part of our ongoing vegetation envelope programme. This proactive maintenance work plays a key role in ensuring road user safety and significantly improved sight lines along the affected routes. Enhanced visibility is particularly important on rural and high-speed corridors, where overgrown vegetation can obstruct views around corners and intersections. The southern area of the network was the focus for September and will be for October also. Roads Completed include:

# 12. REHABILITATIONS

#### Waimate North/Wiroa Intersection

The rehabilitation works are now well underway, with completion targeted for mid-October. Installation of new drainage infrastructure, including kerb and channel systems, has been successfully completed. Site stabilisation was achieved in late September, and the area is scheduled for sealing and asphalt application in early October.













### Kempthorne Road

Significant vegetation removal, including large macrocarpa and poplar trees, has been completed to facilitate improved drainage and the planned widening of the carriageway. Construction activities for both drainage and widening are currently in progress. Stabilisation works are scheduled for completion in November.













### 13. PRE-RESEAL REPAIRS


Pre-sealing repairs for the 2025/2026 season are now underway, with steady progress made throughout September. Key activities included water tabling, stabilised patching, and shoulder repairs—most of which are nearing completion. Brian's crew initiated the patching run in Russell, then moved through Opua before focusing efforts in the Waimate North area. This early start has positioned us well for the upcoming reseal programme.

Looking ahead, the team will shift to Kerikeri and Waipapa Roads in early October, where night shift operations are planned to minimise disruption. These works are part of a broader strategy to ensure the network is well-prepared for the sealing season, with drainage and surface integrity






addressed ahead of time.



### 17. COMPLIMENTS


We received three compliments for the month of September:

# 18. HEALTH & SAFETY & WELLBEING



As of 29 September, the Branch has observed a 9% increase in 5-star driver ratings, alongside a 7% decrease in 4-star ratings and a 2% reduction in 3-star ratings. These figures indicate a positive trend in driver performance and overall service quality. Throughout the reporting period, the Branch consistently maintained high standards, with the majority of drivers rated between 4 and 5 stars, and an overall monthly average of 5 stars. The training provided valuable insight into health and safety systems, their purpose, and their importance in maintaining a proactive and well-protected workforce.
